


What is the HCA Clubhouse Peer-run Program?

The program funds Clubhouse and Peer-run/Recovery Organization to address the unmet needs of individuals experiencing behavioral health challenges by providing a restorative environment for improving social relationships and overall quality of life through...

Recovery Café Model

Core Commitments

- Create a community space that is drug and alcohol free, embracing, and healing
- Nurture structures of loving accountability called Recovery Circles
- Empower every Member to be a contributor
- Raise up Member leaders
- Ensure responsible stewardship
- Work to end systemic racism and socioeconomic inequality so ever person can thrive

What is a Recovery Café?

"The Recovery Café is an alternative, therapeutic, supportive community founded on the truth that every human being is precious and worthy of love regardless of their earlier trauma, mental and emotional anguish, addictive behaviors, or past mistakes." – Recovery Café Network

Key to the model

- > Every person is in need of recovery from something
- > Four types of social support:
 - 1. emotional- empathy, caring concern
 - 2. informational- life and/or vocational training
 - 3. instrumental- assistance to accomplish tasks
 - 4. *affiliation-* learning of social skills, create community and sense of belonging
- Align programming with 10 SAMSHA components of successful recovery programs
- ➤ Referred to as Recovery System of Care (ROSC)
- > Adopted the component of resiliency



What is an RCO?

"A recovery community organization (RCO) is an independent, non-profit organization led and governed by representatives of local communities of recovery." - Faces & Voices

Core Principles

- 1. Recovery vision
 - Long-term recovery
- 2. Authenticity of voice
 - Representing recovery communities; self-governance, mutual aid & support
- 3. Accountability to the recovery community
 - Credibility and effectiveness
 - Accountability & Responsive

Recovery Community Organizations

Faces & Voices established National Standards of RCO - Best Practices

- 1. Non-profit Organization
- 2. Led and Governed by the Recovery Community
- 3. Primary Focus is Recovery from Substance Use Disorders
- 4. Grassroots
- 5. Participatory Process
- 6. Peer Recovery Support Services
- 7. All Pathways Towards Recovery
- 8. Diverse, Equitable, and Inclusive Policies, Practices and Services
- 9. Recovery Friendly Language
- 10.Code of Ethics and Grievance Policies



Alternative Promising Practices

Psychosocial Rehabilitation (PRS)

"Promotes recovery, full community integration and improved quality of life for persons who have been diagnosed with any mental health condition that seriously impairs their ability to lead meaningful lives. PSR services are collaborative, person directed and individualized."

Cultural Promising Practices

Identified promising practices addressing mental health and/ or substance use recovery programming that are specific to the community being served.

Why have a category Alternative Promising Practices?

- Recognize promising practices that align with multicultural approaches in meeting the needs of underrepresented and underserved communities.
- Support expansion priorities to communities that do not currently have programming recognizing disparities in equitable access to services in frontier/rural areas as a barrier to recovery.



Clubhouse Model

Key Components

- Work-ordered day
- Consensus-based decision-making
- Opportunities for paid employment in local labor market
- Access to community-based educational resources
- Connect to crisis intervention services when needed
- Recreational/ social events
- Assistance with safe, decent and affordable housing
- Adheres to 37 Clubhouse Standards
- Washington State Clubhouses: HCA Funded 14 (2 Accredited)

What is a Clubhouse?

"A Clubhouse provides a restorative environment for people whose lives have been severely disrupted because of their mental illness, and who need the support of others who are in recovery and who believe that mental illness is treatable." —Clubhouse International

Fundamental Elements:


- Connected; Right to membership and meaningful relationships
- **Expected:** A person is expected some place daily on a regular basis.
- Needed: Everyone needs to feel needed; their presence is important to others
- ➤ <u>Wanted:</u> To believe there is a least one place on the planet where they are truly wanted.

Beliefs:

- ➤ Everyone deserves a chance at securing meaningful employment
- Everyone deserves to live in an affordable, decent home
- Adults should be engaged in age-appropriate social opportunities.



Clubhouse Peer-run Program Funding History

2017-19 SSB 5883

Funding for existing and new Clubhouses WA State. GSF-\$1,496,000; Stakeholder workgroup expanded definition of Clubhouse

2019-2021 ESHB 1109

Funding for existing and new Clubhouse & Peer Operated/ Recovery Organizations. GSF- \$3,396,000

2021-2023 HB 5092

Legislature continued to provide funding for expansion efforts in WA State. GSF-\$3,396,000

2021-23 HB 5476- Blake

Legislature provided funding through Blake decision for expansion efforts in WA State. GSR-\$3,114,000 2023-25 PSSB 5187

Legislature provided 3 funding sources to continue program efforts; Opioid Abatement Settlement GSF-\$3,500,000; 5092 GSF-\$3,396,000 & Blake 5476 GSF-\$3,114,000.




Prioritizing Clubhouse Peer-run Funding

- Communities lacking Clubhouse or Peer-run/ Recovery Organization
- Marginalized and underserved populations
- Agency in the following categories:
 Startup, Development and Expansion
- Demonstrated knowledge of chosen model; Clubhouse International, Recovery Café, Recovery Community Organization or Alternative Promising Practices
- Primary applicant with 3-years experience operating or substantially supporting Clubhouse or Peer Run model preferred
- If not, letters of support will be requested

Clubhouse Peer-run Program






Community Impacts: Expansion Map



I believe in you; I believe you can recover!



May 1, 2015, through January 31, 2019




Access to Recovery
